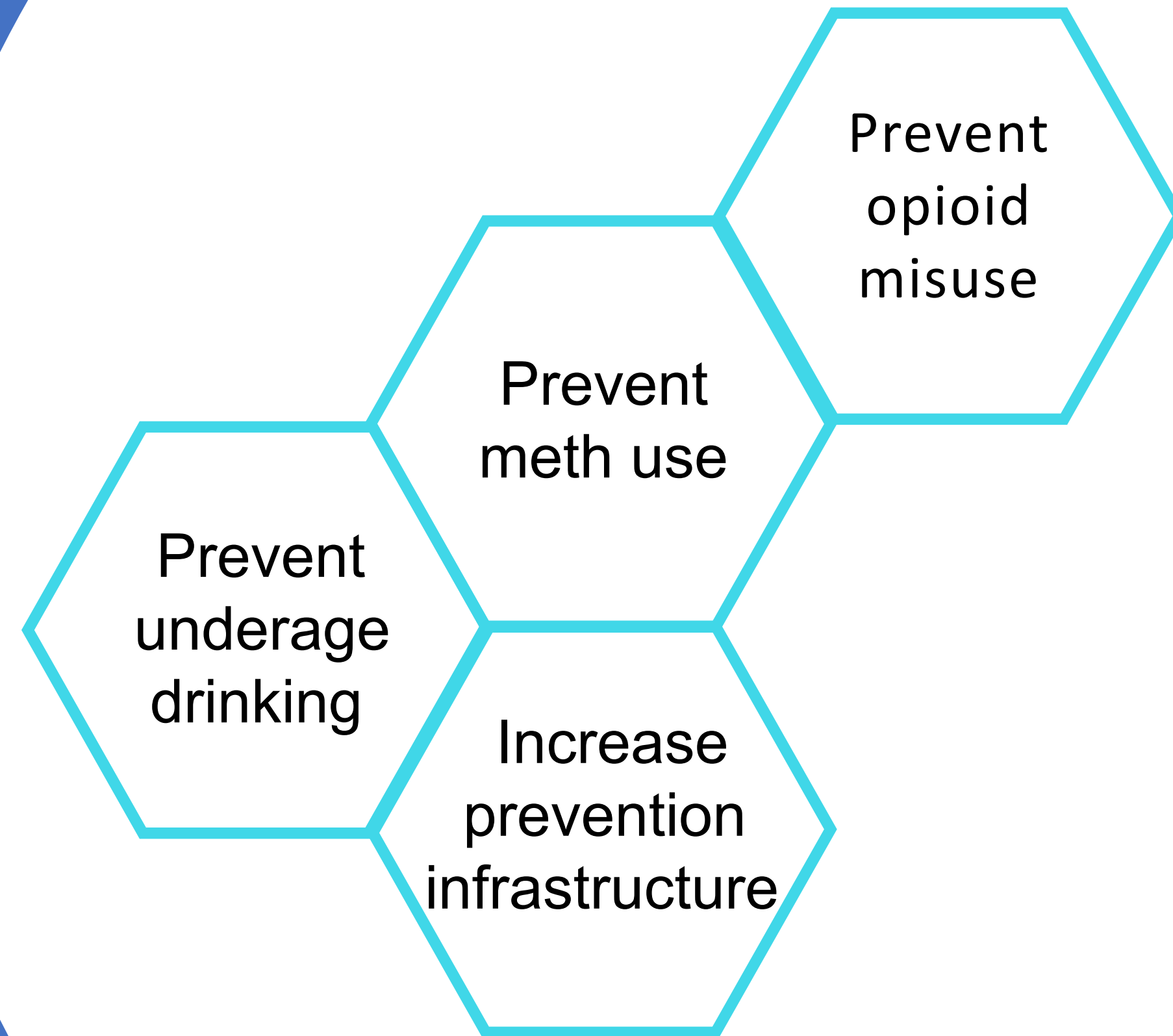

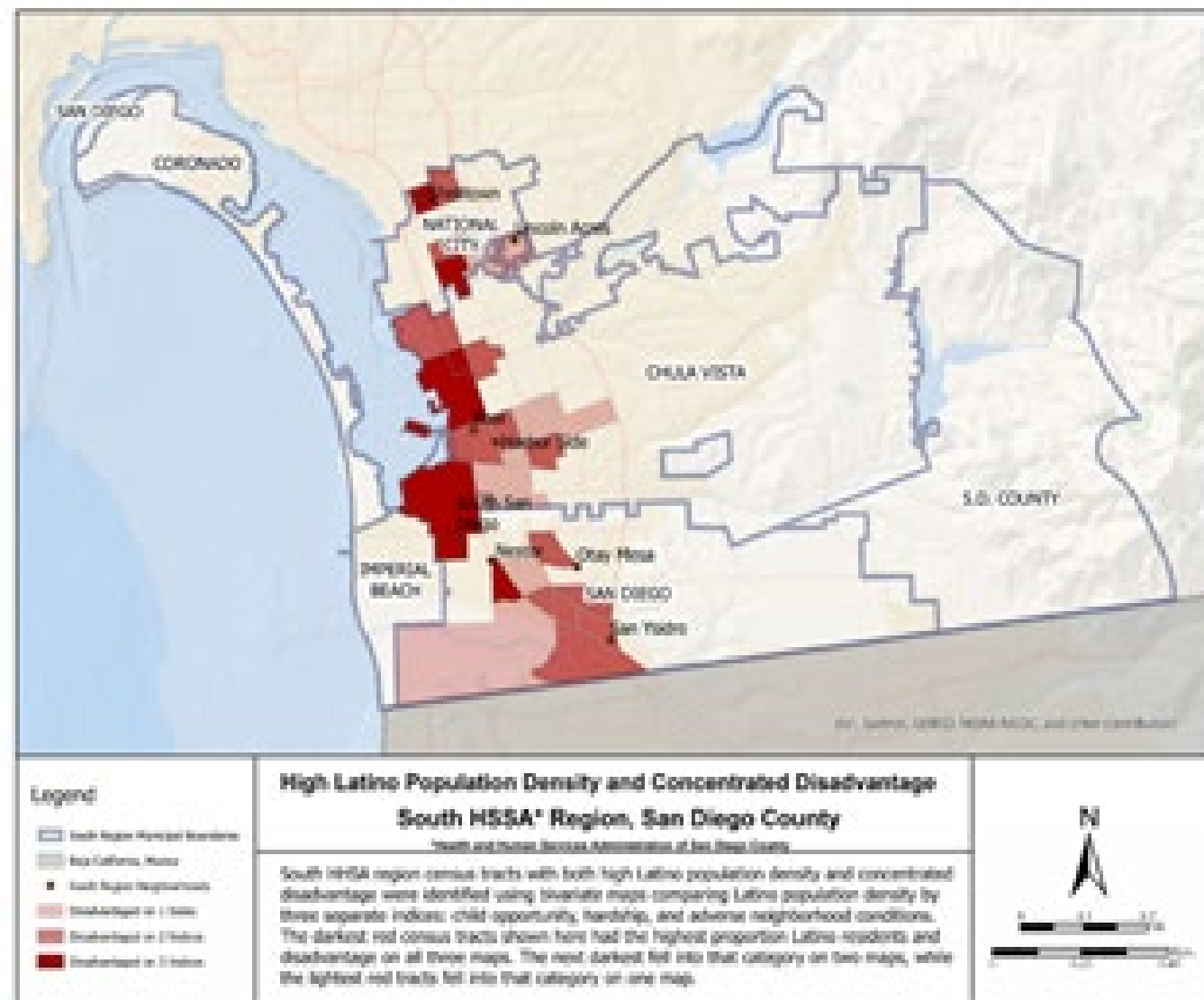
Our program's big idea

The Partnerships 4 Success, led by the Institute for Public Strategies, is committed to working alongside communities to improve community health. The P4S program works to empower community members to increase access to opportunities and combat risk factors that lead to substance misuse among the Latine community members.



Conduct a Needs Assessment

Target Population: Latine/x people in National City, westside Chula Vista, Imperial Beach, San Ysidro and Otay Mesa



Our Qualitative Data found:

Historical underinvestment in the region.

Trust in systems has declined to critical levels among Latinos.

The proximity of the border facilitates underage drinking and the general accessibility of drugs.

Poverty, low-status jobs, and the complexity of public benefits systems are barriers to Latinos accessing health care.

Cultural stigma related to mental health or substance use exists among many Latinos.

Listening Sessions and Focus Groups

"In an environment where community members often have limited means to give feedback, listening sessions are a tool to collect valuable information about people's experiences."

Quotes from Adult Community Members

“Policies in public health and public benefits programs make accessibility very difficult. These programs have barriers within their systems and processes that make it almost impossible for people to access the programs when they need them [...] We [Latinos] have cultural barriers and those can range from the language barriers that exist, to a different cultural approach to health.”

“[Lack of healthy spaces] is at the heart of the Latino population’s health challenges. For example, lack of green space and walkable neighborhoods deters a lot of our residents from riding a bike and walking.

In our Latino Community it is taboo to let others know that we have an addiction. It can be alcohol, it can be drug abuse... I can tell you by personal experience with family members of mine. My parents feeling very embarrassed to share the fact that we need a support with a brother or whoever in my family. So that's something that really prevents families from seeking out help.

Effective Communication is Paramount in Public Health

1. Language is important. Public health advocates must be able to communicate in the languages spoken by community members
2. Cultural competency is equally vital

Having a team that understands the language, culture, and traditions **SHOULD BE** a priority.

What is P4S?

Partnerships 4 Success (P4S) is a program that works to address health inequities in the Latino population. The program focuses on the southern region of San Diego County where more than 60% of the population is Latino.

Why we formed a coalition?

One of the core goals of the P4S program is to build the capacity of residents to act in their own name to improve conditions in the community. We believe that by facilitating networking among local leaders and community mobilization, we can more effectively support residents' efforts to improve their quality of life.

Why community members like you should join?

Community members like you have a vested interest to support the South Bay and Border Communities. You live, work, learn or play in these communities. - Grant funds were also used to pay for a cooking class where 10 community members learned how to make tamales

Empowerment Through Collective Action:

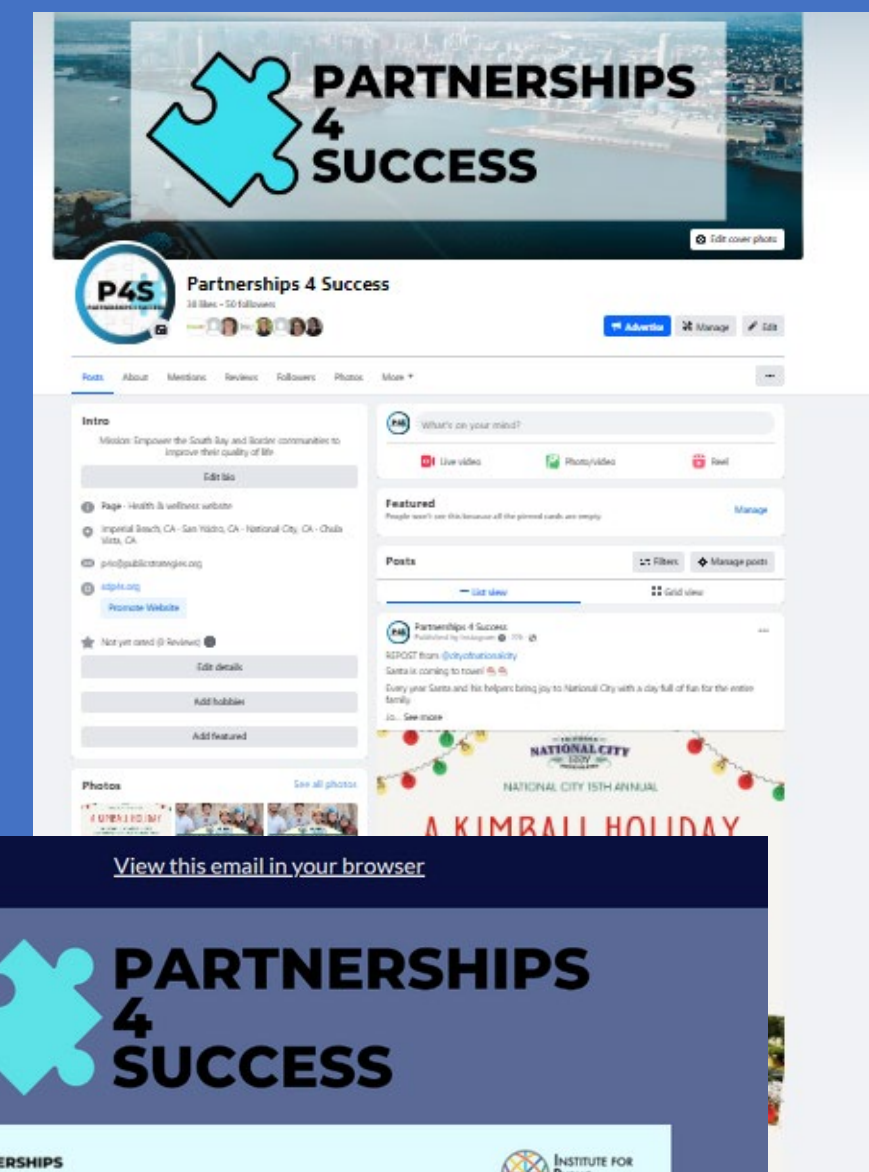
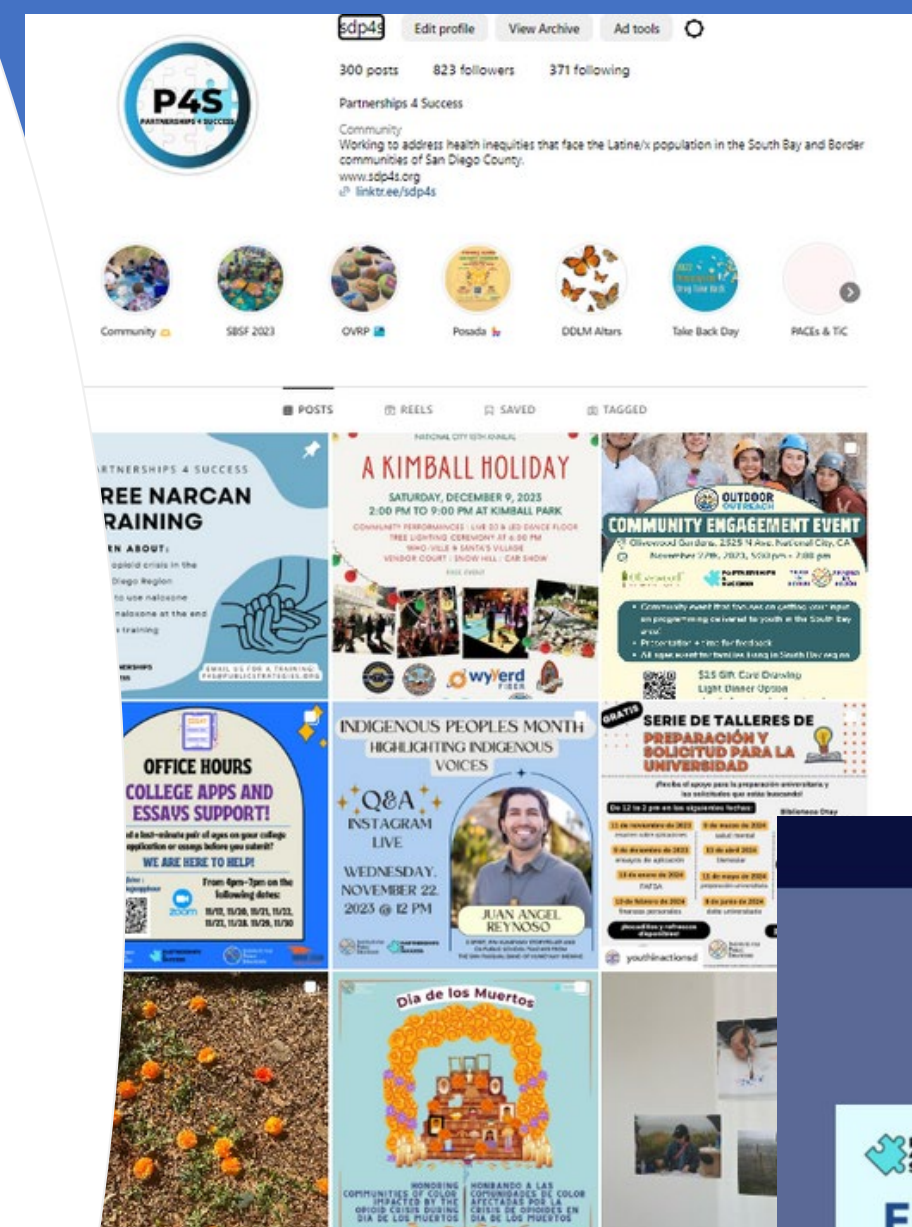
- Collective community efforts can address common health challenges
